A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

As we move into a new and exciting year for AGA, we look back with pride on our accomplishments. I have enclosed, as required by the constitution, our '87 financial report. As you can see we ended the year in the black. This will enable us to move ahead with many projects we've longed to do for some time.

Tucson '88 was a tremendous success and the video tapes are almost finished, for those of you who couldn't make it. The feedback from the surveys we sent out is providing alot of good ideas for next years conference. At our board of directors meeting in Tucson, one of the major topics was ongoing education. We formed the basis for an "education committee" whose task will be to create post graduate gemological training. The idea, it is hoped, will evolve into a full blown course for those who want to stay at the forefront of technology, practical testing and valuation. The first project of this committee is a series of mini-conferences. These will be intensive one and two day hands on workshops dealing with issues of important current gemological concerns. The first is tentatively scheduled for the end of May and will feature C.R. "Cap" Beesley. The topic is country of origin and treatment of colored gems. This will be held in Salt Lake City and will be Friday and Saturday with a concluding fieldtrip Sunday to the Red Beryl mines in Delta Utah. The second is tentatively scheduled for the end of August in San Diego. Friday and Saturday will feature a hands on workshop on diamonds and will conclude with a fieldtrip to the Tourmaline mines on Sunday. These classes will be limited to twenty participants. More on these in future issues.

Our accredited lab program has been well received and a directory of Accredited Labs will be featured in the upcoming CORNERSTONE.

PLEASE VOTE! Enclosed you will find a ballot to vote for a proposed change to the constitution. This should make vast improvements in the governmental structure of AGA. Read it carefully and send your vote back today.

Very soon you will receive information on

upcoming elections. We already have members responding who want to run. The board addressed the issue of elections and revised the way the nominating committee will post names and selections on the voting ballot. Full details on elections will follow in future issues.

AGA has made special arrangements to start a new program called "LAB ALERT" on our bulletin board, AGANET. We are also negotiating to place a very large gemological library and database on AGANET. These will be pay channels. Lab alert will feature gemological lab news from major laboratories around the world and will be coordinated by American Gemological Laboratories and C.R. "Cap" Beesley. We would like to thank Cap for all his help on this project. Stay tuned for developments on this exciting event.

CFH GEMMOLOGY COURSES

The institute seeks contributions from donors in enlarging its stock of training material and instruments.

More and more people are becoming more and more fascinated by coloured stones and diamonds. To meet the current demand for courses in these subjects, the CFH has decided to opt for the double formula of providing both daytime sessions and evening classes, in French at the Institute in Lausanne, and in German in Berne and Zurich.

The Practical Gemmology programme is scheduled to cover 3 consecutive days or a cycle of 12 evenings spread over 12 weeks. The objectives of this course are:

-- to impact the necessary basic knowledge to give participants confidence and improve their performance;

- -- to acquaint participants with identification instruments and their use;
- -- to enable participants to differentiate natural transparent gems from certain synthetic stones and the more common imitations;
- -- to enable participants to give their customers information and advice about gemstones;
- -- to give participants an introduction to the world of coloured gemstones that will enable them to decide whether or not to undertake further gemmological studies.

The Diamond Grading programme lasts 2 days or 4 evenings. At the end of the course the participants are able to:

- --correctly read a certificate made out by an official laboratory;
- -- correctly interpret the degree of purity, the colour and the proportions of the cut;
- -- use this knowledge in their dealings with customers.

All stones must be cut by the entrant.


Stone Sizes:

"Primus", the Novice Cut, is to be no less than 8mm and no greater than 10mm measured across the flat.

"Poly Eight", the Intermediate Cut, should be 8x10mm plus or minus 1 (one) mm in either dimension.
"Nulli Secundus", the Master stone, must be

"Nulli Secundus", the Master stone, must be 15mm (top to bottom or across the shoulders), plus or minus 1/2 (.5) mm.

Official Ballot


At the board of governors and board of directors meeting in Tucson, February 7, 1988, the motion was made to change a portion of the constitution. Specifically we wanted to change that portion which defines the structure of regions and regional governors. The board expressed concern that the current system of sixteen regions and governors was far too cumbersome and that maintenance of this many regions, all of which were supposed to be developing chapters, was unrealistic. A motion to create four simple regions based on population distribution of membership was placed before the board. This would divide the country into four equal sections with one regional governor to represent each section. "Equal" refers to the total number of members per a geographic area and not the geographic area itself.

Since there are not enough members residing outside the United States to justify a seperate region, they would become members of the region in which the "current" international headquaters resided (the same as the president). There would be no regional governor at large and with only four regions each governor could then focus on benefits for it's region with much greater economic sense. Further it was proposed that these regions be adjusted by the "current" treasurer and board to accomodate the population distribution. This may be done annually as dues are collected for that year, or as the treasurer and board may see need based on radical change in population distribution. The governors of each region would be elected concurrent with the board of directors and would serve the same two year term. Once elected the governor of that region (i.e. region 1) would stay governor of that region even if his or her place of residence was to fall outside that region either by change of residence or change of boundary in the region itself unless they request, in writing to the board, to be replaced. In that instance the president and board will have the power to replace that regional governor for the balance of the term without vote by the entire nmembership. A majority vote by the board (as defined by the constitution) would be required to install a new regional governor.

Your current board of directors and regional governors have voted unanimously to approve this motion and recommend you vote yes to this proposed change to the constitution.

On the back of this page is the ballot with a map of the regions as they would exist based on the current membership population distribution, if the change is approved. Please read the proposed change and mail this ballot back right away. Your vote counts!

Feel free to enclose any comments in with the post paid envelope but do not put anything other than the official ballot in the envelope market "BALLOT". This will insure a secret ballot procedure.



This shows how the "NEW" regions would be set up based on current member population.

Please follow the procedure below:

- 1. Place a mark for your vote on ballot below.
- 2. Insert this ballot in the enclosed envelope market "BALLOT" and seal.
- 3. Place the sealed "BALLOT" envelope in the post paid envelope enclosed.
- 4. Seal the envelope and write your name across the back flap of the envelope.
- 5. Mail in post paid envelope by 4-30-88.

PLEASE VOTE BELOW TO INDICATE YOUR CHOICE:

The current constitution of the Accredited Gemologists Association should be ammended to allow the regions as they exist to be changed to four only. These will be based on the membership population distribution to create as close as possible, four equally populated regions within the United States. Members residing outside the United States will belong to the region hosting the International Headquarters. Governors of these four regions will be elected every two years concurrent with election of board of directors as specified by the constitution. These governors will remain in place for the full term regardless of any change of personal address or regional boundary unless they submit resignation to the board in writing. Thirty day advance notice is necessary. Upon resignation of a governor the board shall, at the direction of the president, install a new regional governor. This will be by a majority vote of the board and only for the balance of term until the next general election. The board, at the direction of the current treasurer, shall have the ability to change regional boundaries as the population of membership changes. This may be adjusted annually as dues are collected or as needed with sudden changes in population base.
